Food articles

canned foods (with sanitary, phytosanitary, veterinary certificates, as needed and expiration date at least one year away)

tuna fish,
sardines
beef luncheon

- toast and biscuits
- only bottled still water, 0,5L

Clothes

- new, warm winter clothes for adults (men and women) and children
- socks, underwear

Daily individual hygiene package

Small soap - 15 gr
Shower gel - 20ml
Hotel package toothbrush and toothpaste
Antiseptic gel for hand sanitizing - 50ml
Wet tissues 15/1
Band-aids (10/1)

Food and hygiene needs for babies

Baby food - fruit 120gr
Baby food - vegetable and chicken mix 128gr
High-protein biscuit 120gr

Diapers (6/1)
Baby wet wipes 40/1

Other needs

Thermos, 0,5l - 11
Rescue Thermal Reflect Foil (dimensions 160 x 210cm)
Raincoats (nylon)



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NEEDS OF THE RED CROSS OF SERBIA

The Red Cross of Serbia is working at maximum capacity in order to provide the best assistance to migrants, refugees, but also to the local population whose humanitarian needs are very strong. Red Cross local branches that, for a longer time period have and will have increased efforts in meeting the needs of refugees and migrants, are in need of support as follows:

- Metal container houses
to be used as an office space and storage space for daily amounts of goods necessary for distribution on defined localities. The places of distribution of humanitarian aid are displaced from the offices of Red Cross local branches, and it is necessary to have distribution points and to properly store humanitarian aid.
- Humanitarian aid distribution vehicles
that are of the utmost importance to Red Cross local branches that are the most burdened with the reception and assistance to refugees and migrants. There is a need for vehicles that can transport people and humanitarian aid in the amount of cca 1,5 t.
- Financial support for covering additional costs
 - Hiring additional human resources to meet the necessity of working in three shifts.
 - Coverage of additional operating costs, such as electricity, fuel, telephone bills, warehouse rent and needed equipment such as forklifts.
 - Procurement of the most necessary additional office equipment (furniture, heaters) and technical equipment (computer, printer) in order to responsibly monitor the distribution of humanitarian aid and reporting to donors.
